Why can't I get a seat???

The demand for tickets for Little Women, resulted in two additional performances. Adding extra performances requires consultation with the cast and crew (most of whom have day jobs) our caterer and volunteers for the other roles. Careful (time-consuming) monitoring of the pattern of sales is required as capacity reaches the critical point before adding extra performances is considered.

For a performance to go ahead, the minimum audience number is 15. Once this is passed, all is well. Below that number means a lot of work re-booking folks to make sure that each performance has a reasonable audience. Our usual pattern is ten performances... eight evenings and two matinees... this means that a total of 500 seats are available unless additional performances are offered. To secure a booking... getting in as early as practical is the key to a great night out.

The First Question

"Good evening (afternoon) welcome to The Octagon... what name are you booked under?"

"Um...."

Because we seat folks in groups, (the little white labels on your table) knowing who made the booking is helpful to our Front of House team so that they can seat you with your friends (or maybe someone new!).

Did You know?

Yes, we have a Greenroom (but it's not green) so...

Why is it called a "Greenroom"?

The origin is rather mysterious, and there are many theories. One points to two historic London theatres—the Blackfriars Theatre and Cockpit-at-Court—that reportedly pioneered "green" rooms backstage.

The term itself may have evolved from "greengage," which was Cockney slang used to refer to the stage. A room off the stage, then, may have been called the "greengage room," which later became just "greenroom."

Another idea is that older theatres had rooms dedicated to protecting costumes where the walls were covered in red or green baize (a felted fabric used to cover gaming tables). This could explain why some early greenrooms were red.

Yet another guess suggests that the term comes from "scene room"—the space where actors could prepare before going onstage which transformed over time to "greenroom." Other sources suggest that it was associated with makeup which in earlier times (1600s – 1700s) required a period of "curing" after it was applied. The makeup was said to be "green" until it was set enough for the actor to go on stage, so they sat in a room close to the stage as the makeup set on their faces

Another speculation is that early theatres painted waiting rooms green to soothe actors' eyes away from the harsh stage lights.

Even deeper in history, performances of plays were often held "on the village green" by travelling players and in Greek and Roman times it is said that there was a quiet vine enclosed area near a stage for players to relax and prepare before appearing in their roles

The Octagon "green room" is a multifunctional room at the rear of the site where our casts get dressed... apply makeup... go over their lines and support each other.

It's a social space as well as a working / store space.

A cast and crew of a production are together for many weeks... from auditions... to weeks and weeks of rehearsal... to first night... to last night... it's a very important space.... (but it's not green).
